Overbooking warning

Notice: Overbooking of Flights - Airline flights may be overbooked, and there is a slight chance that a seat will not be available on a flight for which a person has a confirmed reservation. If the flight is overbooked, no one will be denied a seat until airline personnel first ask for volunteers willing to give up their reservation in exchange for compensation of the airline's choosing. If there are not enough volunteers, the airline will deny boarding to other persons in accordance with its particular boarding priority. With few exceptions, including failure to comply with the carrier's check-in deadline (which are available upon request from the air carrier), persons denied boarding involuntarily are entitled to compensation. The complete rules for the payment of compensation and each airline's boarding priorities are available at all airport ticket counters and boarding locations. Some airlines do not apply these consumer protections to travel from some foreign countries, although other consumer protections may be available. Check with your airline or your travel agent.

Baggage liability

For flights within the U.S., federal rules require any limit on an airline's baggage liability to be at least \$3,500 per passenger. For international travel (including domestic portions of international journeys) different liability limitations apply to the loss, delay, or damage to baggage. If the Montreal Convention applies, the limit is 1,131 Special Drawing Rights (approximately \$1,700 per passenger) unless a higher value is declared in advance and additional charges are paid. If the Warsaw Convention applies, the limit is approximately \$9.07 per pound (\$20.00 per kilogram) for checked baggage and \$400 per passenger for unchecked baggage unless a higher value is declared in advance and additional charges are paid. Excess valuation may not be declared on certain types of valuable articles. Airlines may assume no liability for fragile or perishable articles. Check with your airline.

TSA data collection

The Transportation Security Administration of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security requires us to collect information from you for purposes of watch list screening, under the authority of 49 U.S.C. section 114, and the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004. Providing this information is voluntary; however, if it is not provided, you may be subject to additional screening or denied transport or authorization to enter a sterile area. TSA may share information you provide with law enforcement or intelligence agencies or others under its published system of records notice. Disinsection

- Some Lithium batteries
- (e.g. spares in checked baggage, batteries over a certain size)
- Explosives / Fireworks,
- Strike anywhere matches/ Lighter fluid,
- Compressed gases / Aerosols,
- Oxygen bottles/
- Liquid oxygen,
- Flammable liquids,
- Pesticides/ Poison and
- Corrosive material.
